



# Rob Bartholomew: A Legacy of Excellence in Aviation and Ballooning

Few individuals have left as profound a mark on the world of ballooning and aviation as Rob Bartholomew. With a career spanning over five decades, Rob has not only soared to great heights—both literally and figuratively—but has also shaped the sport through leadership, mentorship, and an unwavering dedication to excellence.

From earning his hot air balloon license in 1974 to competing on the world stage and serving as a guiding force in aviation safety and education, Rob's journey is a testament to passion, perseverance, and pioneering spirit. Today, we celebrate his extraordinary contributions and welcome him into the Hall of Fame, honoring a lifetime dedicated to the skies.

In 1972, at the age of 27, Rob Bartholomew was hard at work farming his 3,000-acre operation when a group of hot air balloons unexpectedly landed in his field. Having never seen a balloon before, he was completely mesmerized. In that moment, he knew he would fly one someday.

Farming was a full-time commitment that left little room for hobbies, but fate intervened when Rob broke his ankle. The injury forced him to slow down, giving him the time to explore the fascinating world of ballooning. In January 1974, while still in a full-leg cast, he took his first flight with Phil Gray. By May of that year, his first balloon, "The Streak," had arrived.

Becoming a balloon pilot in those days was a different process than it is to-

day. At the time, there was only one type of license—a commercial license. To earn it, a pilot had to pass a written test, complete flight instruction, and pass a check ride. Rob logged four training flights, totaling seven hours of instruction with Phil Gray, completed one solo flight, and passed his check ride with Tom Oerman. With that, he was officially a balloonist. While some of his friends and family were excited about his new passion, his father thought he was "off his rocker."

Over the years, advancements in balloon technology have greatly improved the sport. Equipment upgrades—such as more efficient burners and **Tracy Barnes' invention** of the parachute top—have revolutionized ballooning.

Rob's journey as a dealer for Barnes Balloons began after he took his first ride in one in 1976. He appreciated how easily they could be assembled, and his wife, Linda, a skilled repair specialist, found them easy to sew

and maintain. From that point on, Barnes became their brand of choice.

In 1978, Balloons Over Iowa Balloon Ltd was born. Since then, Rob has become an FAA Designated Examiner, conducting 612 check flights. Linda serves as Chief Inspector, having completed 3,313 annual inspections and repairs on 1,601 balloons. With over 2,000 flight hours, most of Rob's time in the air has been dedicated to check flights, helping new pilots earn their wings.

Rob and four fellow balloonists also co-founded **Balloons Over Iowa**, a club unlike any other—one without bylaws, where budgets are measured in kegs instead of dol-

lars, and where the club president has always been a dog. Cleo, a balloon-loving basset hound, was the first president, followed by several more hard-working canine successors. Despite its unconventional structure, Balloons Over Iowa has become one of the strongest and most successful ballooning organizations in the country. The club actively supports both the National Balloon Museum and the National Balloon Classic in Indianola, Iowa.

Additionally, the club runs one of the top **FAA-approved ground schools in the nation**, drawing an average of **40 students** per session. While many states have seen a decline in balloon pilots, lowa has experienced steady growth in

numbers. Rob attributes this to the state's long history as the home of the **U.S.Hot Air Balloon Championships** for 18 years and the continued success of the **National Balloon Classic**, which provides opportunities for balloonists to fly both morning and evening. Many second and third generation pilots have emerged from these events, ensuring the sport's legacy continues.

Some of Rob's flight experiences have been thrilling—especially the one over Lake Michigan. I can only imagine the mix of excitement and panic when the fog rolled in just after take off. Linda and the crew were searching all day, only to find him at the hotel bar? Classic! He might still be making up for that one.

Among Rob's most cherished memories is winning the **U.S. National Hot Air Balloon Championship in Indianola**, making him the only lowan to achieve this feat. His victory earned him a place at the **World Hot Air Balloon Championship in Saga, Japan, in 1989.** Beyond the competition, Rob fondly remembers the kindness and generosity of the Japanese people. One local resident even filmed their entire flight, and, to Rob and Linda's surprise, gifted them the footage—a treasured keepsake from an unforgettable experience.


- Member of the Balloon Federation of America (BFA) since 1974.


